The Quakers snagged a share of the Ivy League title in dramatic fashion, scoring in overtime against Harvard and punched their ticket to the NCAA for the first time since 2002. Facing George Mason in the first round, Penn's air-tight defense will be tested by a team that has scored 19 goals in the last seven games.

• **Penn is making its eighth appearance in the national championship tournament;** and the second under head coach Rudy Fuller. The most recent was in 2002 when the Quakers defeated Seton Hall before dropping to Connecticut in the second round. Penn has advanced as far as the quarterfinals three times (1969, 72, 73)

• **Penn has 12 seniors on its roster;** and could field a team with only seniors. Nine of those seniors do start alongside two freshmen. The Quakers have regularly used five players off the bench and have been able to go deeper into the roster in some games. The only two players to not see any game time this season are injured.

• **At 11-2-4 overall, Penn has registered the first 10-win season since 2002** and is one shy of that season's 12-win mark.

• **Penn finished 5-1-1 in the Ivy League,** and shares the title with Dartmouth. It is the first Ivy League title for Penn men's soccer since 2002.

Anatomy of a Season...

the things that have made this a season to remember thus far...

Aug. 3 - A sign of things to come? Penn's incoming class was ranked No. 36 in the country by College Soccer News. Christian Barriero was named a Top 100 Freshman to Watch.

Sept. 5 - Penn opens the season with a scoreless tie against Marquette, the first of seven consecutive shutouts for the Quakers.

Sept. 12 - Andrew Ferry scores twice while Drew Healy makes eight saves to shutdown Seton Hall's potent offense.

Sept. 14 - The Quakers take down American to win the Princeton Classic.

Sept. 21 - Penn destroys a hapless Mercer, piling up six goals it was the second highest output under Coach Rudy Fuller.

Sept. 24 - The Quakers get revenge on Penn State for a heart-breaking double-overtime loss in 2007, cruising to a 3-0 victory.

Sept. 28 - Penn's shutout streak is snapped just 3:25 into the game vs. Temple. Penn salvages a 2-2 tie to remain unbeaten on the season.

Oct. 7 - The Quakers suffer their first defeat in dramatic fashion—just 1:34 from settling for a tie with Lehigh.

Oct. 11 - Penn complete its worst week with a shocking loss to Columbia in the Quakers first home Ivy game of the season.

Oct. 18 - Alex Grendi launches a rocket from 40 yards out to defeat Dartmouth. The win would ultimately give Penn the Ivy League's NCAA automatic bid.

Oct. 25 - Omid Shokoufandeh scores in the 89th minute to put the Quakers ahead of Yale in a rainy, windy contest.

Nov. 1 - Penn easily handles Brown, the preseason favorite in the Ivy League.

Nov. 8 - Princeton ties Penn making the final game of the season a "must win" for the Quakers' title hopes.

Nov. 16 - After postponing due to heavy rain, Penn and Harvard battle for 94 minutes until Loukas Tasigianis knocks one in for the overtime winner and the Ivy title.

- **Penn has won four of its last five matches.** The Quakers are 4-0-1 since losing back-to-back games in the middle of the season.

- **Penn played six overtime matches this season,** tying Marquette (0-0), Buffalo (0-0), Temple (2-2) and Princeton (0-0); losing to Lehigh (2-1) and beating Harvard (1-0).

- **With 32 goals to date, this year's team has scored more than any other team since the 1983 team scored 32.** Penn's single-season record is a whopping 76 in 16 games in 1972.

- **You want to beat Penn this season?** Only one ingredient has worked to date: score first. Even then, you might tie, but the Quakers are 0-2-1 when their opponent scores first.

- **Defensively, Penn has allowed only 11 goals;** there are only three teams in the country that have allowed fewer this season.

- **Penn has allowed just one goal in its last five matches;** that goal was in the 64th minute against Yale. That span also included 24:08 of overtime minutes.

- **Penn has had 10 different men score goals this season.** All but two players have registered at least one point this season.

- Three Quakers have registered multi-goal games this season — **Andrew Ferry** (vs. Seton Hall), **Jake Levin** (vs. Mercer) and **Omid Shokoufandeh** (vs. Cornell and Brown).

- **Shokoufandeh** leads the Ivy League in game-winning goals (5).

- **Shokoufandeh's** 22 points this season is the most for a Penn player since 1995.

- Senior **Alex Grendi** meanwhile, is tied for third in career assists at Penn with 20. More impressive is the others in the top five are all marks set in the 1970s.

- Speaking of records, **Drew Healy** has made a name for himself with Penn's single-season record for shutouts (!1) and total minutes (1632:34) and consecutive shutout minutes (684:12).

- **All-Ivy Accolades:** Three days after hoisting the Ivy League trophy, eight Quakers were recognized with All-Ivy honors. Seniors **Grendi** and **Shokoufandeh** were first team while Grendi's was a unanimous selection. Seniors **Brian Mascarenhas** and **Drew Healy** were named to the second team. Senior **Kevin Unger** was named honorable mention All-Ivy as well as three-fourths of the Quakers impenetrable backline: **John Elicker**, **Ryan Porch** and **Jake Levin**.












- **Series History:** The Quakers and Patriots have met just once in program history—Sept. 12, 1999 at the Mason Classic where Penn lost 1-0.

Head Coach Rudy Fuller

James C. Gentle Head Coach of Men's Soccer ♦ 11th Season ♦ Georgetown '93



The James C. Gentle Head Coach of Men's Soccer, Rudy Fuller enters his 11th season at the helm of the University of Pennsylvania men's soccer program in 2008. In a decade at Penn, Fuller has elevated the Quakers' notoriety in the Ivy League and nationally. From renovating Rhodes Field to recruiting some of the best players in the country and stacking the Quakers' schedule with NCAA contenders, Fuller's club has established itself as one of the elite soccer programs in the country.

In 2006, Penn finished 9-4-2 and 5-1-1 for second place in the Ivy League. The Quakers boasted the League's lowest goals-against average and returned a solid core of defenders in 2007. That group was tested early with a cross-country trek to take on Cal and Stanford. Additional non-conference challengers on the 2007 slate included national powers the likes of Seton Hall, Penn State and Rutgers, proving Penn's commitment to competing on the national scene.

Speaking of being noticed nationally, former goalkeeper Daniel Cepero, after completing his time with the Quakers in 2006, was drafted by the New York Red Bulls of Major League Soccer. He is the second Quaker-turned-pro under Fuller. Keeper Matthew Haefner did the same in 2004.

Each of Fuller's 10 seasons has brought some new success. In 2005, the Quakers finished 9-6-1, were ranked as high as No. 18 nationally and won the Philadelphia Soccer Seven (PS7) title. Fuller was named the PS7 Coach of the Year—an honor he had previously earned in 2001 and 2002 and received again in 2006.

At the beginning of the decade, the program went from the basement of the Ivy League to champions in two seasons. The 2002 Penn squad finished with a 12-4-1 record, captured its first Ivy League championship in 22 years, earned its first NCAA Tournament bid in 25 years and its first NCAA Tournament win in 29 years.

Penn was ranked as high as 14th in the nation during the season and spent much of the year in the Top 25. Penn goalkeeper Haefner was named third-team NSCAA All-America, becoming Penn's first All-America since 1984. Haefner also became Penn's first men's soccer player to be named Ivy League Player of the Year.

Following the season, Fuller was named the 2002 Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year by the NSCAA and 2002 Men's Soccer Coach of the Year by the SEPSCA.

The Quakers set three program records in 2002—shutouts in a season (10), lowest goals-against average (0.45) and highest save percentage in a season (.923). The 2002 squad also allowed the second-fewest goals in the program's history in a single season with seven. Haefner also set individual goalkeeping records that reflected the team marks from 2002.

In the category of individual honors, Fuller has coached 22 players to 38 All-Ivy honors, nine NSCAA All-Mid Atlantic Region and 12 (17 honors) PS7 All-Stars.

Fuller's student-athletes have also excelled in the classroom during his tenure. Penn has found itself among the best and brightest and has been honored with the National Soccer Coaches Association of America's Team Academic Award for the past nine seasons. The Quakers' team GPA has been in the top-10 nationwide in each of the past eight years, and in 2000, they earned the highest GPA of any Division I men's soccer program.

Penn is one of just 14 institutions—and the only Ivy League school—to have both its men's and women's soccer teams honored by the NSCAA for its academics, and it has happened seven times.

Prior to Penn, Fuller played a major role as a student-athlete and coach in building a successful program at Georgetown University. While coaching at Georgetown, Fuller helped guide the Hoyas to the first two NCAA tournaments in their history and the NCAA Round of 16 in 1997.

Fuller has served on the staff of the Region I Olympic Development Program (ODP) and the Eastern Pennsylvania (EPa) ODP. In 2002, Fuller helped lead the EPa 1984 Boys ODP team to the National Championship, and his EPa 1987 Boys ODP team was a Region I ODP Championship finalist. Fuller has led the last six ODP teams to the Region I finals and has captured four titles. Prior to joining the Region I and Eastern Pennsylvania staffs, Fuller was a part of the Maryland ODP for 13 years, four as a player and nine as a coach.

Fuller served on the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Committee and was chair of the NCAA Division I Middle Atlantic Regional Advisory Committee. He also sat on the NSCAA/adidas College Ranking Committee for the Mid-Atlantic Region and is a member of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

Most recently, Fuller began serving as a scout for U.S. Soccer in the inaugural season of the Development Academy. In addition, he served as an assistant coach at the 2008 U-15 National team camp in St. Louis.

Fuller, a USSF "A" Licensed coach, graduated from Georgetown with a bachelor of science in business administration in 1993 and earned his MBA degree at Villanova in 2003. He founded and currently serves as the director of the Elite 300 Soccer Academy.

Fuller and his wife, Kate; sons Reilly (8) and Liam (6); and daughter Fiona (3) reside in Philadelphia.
